#### **November 25**

09:00 h / Opening of the Conference

SESSION 1: Presentation of the LIFE LynxConnect Project

09:30 - 10:15

This inaugural session will present the general framework of the LIFE LynxConnect project, a key European initiative for the recovery of the Iberian lynx. Strategic objectives, main action lines, involved territories, and collaborating entities (public administrations, NGOs, research centers, and local communities) will be discussed.

Key achievements of the project will also be highlighted, including the increase of lynx populations, habitat improvement, awareness campaigns, and progress in connectivity and reproduction.

**SESSION 2:** The Origins of the Iberian Lynx

11:45 - 12:15

This scientific session will explore the origin and evolution of the Iberian lynx, from its fossil ancestors to its currently limited distribution. Paleontological and ecological studies will be presented, focusing on the lynx's role in Mediterranean ecosystems, its specialized diet (Iberian rabbit), and how its phylogenetic history has shaped its vulnerability.

Topics include the evolutionary history of the Iberian lynx, the Quibas skeleton, extra-peninsular distribution, taphonomy, and historical records of lynx presence.

**SESSION 3:** Advances in Mammal Population Monitoring Techniques **12:15 – 13:30** 

Experts will present monitoring tools (camera trapping, radio tracking, genetic censuses) and discuss updated population statistics and demographic patterns.

**SESSION 6:** Genetic Aspects of the Iberian Lynx

Presentations will include results from genetic monitoring, levels of genetic diversity across populations, and management strategies (captive breeding, translocations, genetic planning).

#### **FIELD VISIT**

Participants will observe implemented strategies, interact with field technicians, and explore real lynx habitats and signs of presence.
